Since the Bill Drafting Unit was inaugurated, it's been a great help to the committees' counsels as well as the Members in answering technical questions on bill drafting. I'm not yet of the belief that a new process or structure needs to be added to improve bill

drafting or to add any further independence from the members.

18. What specifically will you do as a City Council Member to ensure New York achieves a full and complete Census count in 2020?

The need for a census count that includes responses from as many residents as possible is critical. I plan to make my office and staff available for use by the City to push information out on the counting mechanisms as well as publicly encourage all community groups and civics where I speak to spread information to their constituencies.

19. In 2016, Citizens Union helped craft and push for the enactment of a law that placed political contribution limits and disclosure requirements on nonprofits that are formed by, or affiliated with, elected officials, which helped prevent some significant features of an emerging "pay-to-play" culture in New York City. Do you have any other ideas to further limit such a culture and create a better environment where contributions, either personal or political, do not unduly influence the actions of elected officials?

Right now, there is great opportunity for discussion on how our City's ethics rules can be further strengthened around the issues of transparency and preventing quid pro quo. From re-examining whether and how we award dollars to groups to examining the laws around the City itself having a not-for-profit arm just for issues, now is the right time to pursue greater reform.

1. Housing: advocate for more affordable housing with a preference for district residents.

2. Housing: fight to prevent zoning as a means to displace residents and change

neighborhood character.

3. Education: funding to repair school facilities and maintain/renovate classrooms.

4. Education: increase spending on early childhood education resources (separate from UPK).

5. Healthcare: advocate for greater access to quality and affordable healthcare options through funding and fighting to keep hospitals / clinics open.

For the better part of the past two years, the City and State benefitted from having some of the most innovative ideas in criminal justice and civic reforms come from the 45th City Council District. Jumaane Williams took his ideas Citywide and even Statewide, seeing that laws were passed to make real headway in criminal justice reform and police-community relations. However, that sort of issue-based campaigning takes time away from the district.

My intent is to spend my full-term representing the 45th City Council District and focusing on the district's needs. It's time for a district-based approach by the Council Member holding that seat.

Moreover, my time serving the 45th City Council District as senior staff has been marked by a dogged commitment to transparent operations for the office. Participatory budgeting--especially as one of the originating Council Districts for it--was one of my most important jobs, and ensuring that the public knew all the facts surrounding how we solicited input and made decisions was essential. That is emblematic of the manner in which I intend to run operations in the office: with a full view for the public and their involvement whenever possible.
